Dr. Richman's commitment to fostering the next generation of leading scientists has left an indelible mark in our field. He has recruited and assembled some of the most brilliant.



Dan Werb, PhD

Assistant Professor, Division of Infectious Diseases and Global Public Health Department of Medicine University of California San Diego

Tell us a little about yourself.

I was born in Vancouver, Canada and went to college in Montreal. Fun fact: I'm on my fourth career. I started out in book publishing, then worked in journalism, then was a professional touring musician, and now I'm an epidemiologist.

What attracted you to this field?

I was attracted to epidemiology because it is one of the most powerful tools to reveal and communicate the inequalities that marginalized populations face. I grew up in Vancouver, which has one of North America's largest open-air illegal drug markets in the Downtown Eastside neighborhood. The extreme poverty that exists in this neighborhood – and in other neighborhoods across the United States - is a testimony to our collective failure in understanding and responding to the many health conditions of poverty. Epidemiology seemed to me as the best way to advocate for

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How did you land in San Diego and/or start working at UC San Diego?

I was invited to do a postdoctoral fellowship with Dr. Steffanie Strathdee focused on the impact of policing and addiction treatment barriers in Tijuana on the health of people who inject drugs.

What are the major issues facing HIV researchers today?

The major issues facing HIV researchers are those that have been in place for decades: the fact that policy dictates health to a massive degree, and the related issue that people who are at greatest risk of HIV often have had their political voices silenced by marginalization. As scientists we need to collectively amplify the voices of key populations – women who engage in sex work, people who use drugs, and LGBTQ+ communities – to push for the reform of policies that criminalize, marginalize and stigmatize them. This is the best path towards eradicating HIV.

What are some of your research interests and/or what are you working on right now?

My main research interest is in understanding the process of injection drug use initiation and finding ways to disrupt it. It's an underserved area of 'upstream HIV prevention' with a huge potential upside in reducing the burden of HIV morbidity and mortality among people who inject drugs.

What are some of your favorite or most important projects?

I am super proud of PRIMER (*PReventing Injecting by Modifying Existing Responses*; (www.primerstudy.com), which is the international cohort consortium that I established to investigate ways to prevent injection drug use initiation using a harm reduction lens. I am also really proud of my non-fiction book, *City of Omens: A Search for the Missing Women of the*

Borderlands (http://smarturl.it/cityofomens), which was selected by the New York Times Book Review as one of six true crime books on its 2019 Summer Reading List. You should buy it!

What is most important lesson you have learned during your tenure at UC San Diego?

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you can be sure you will have a positive impact, and that's by being a committed and supportive mentor. I learned that from my mentors, especially Dr. Steffanie Strathdee, and I am doing my best to pay it forward.


